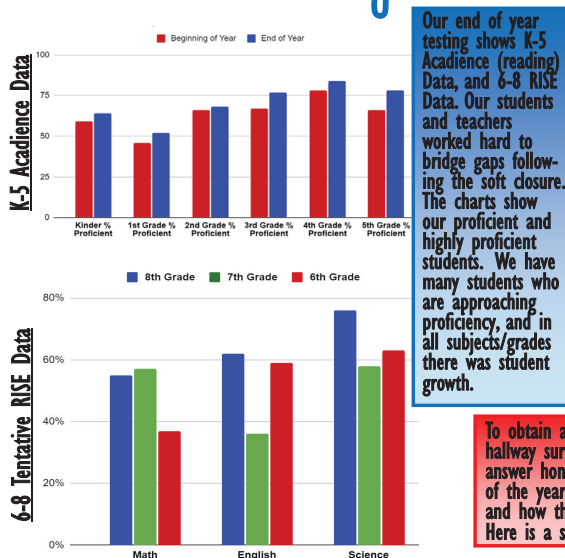

PRE ASSESSMENT and POST ASSESSMENT



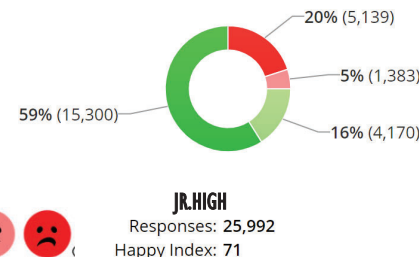
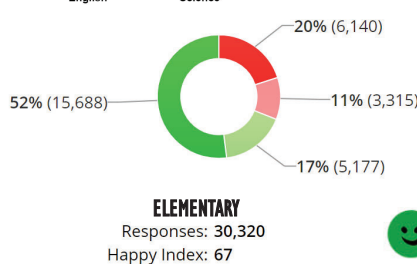
This school year the counselors were able to provide social emotional lessons, college and career lessons, grade level transition lessons, and so much more. There were 522 in class and student supports lessons given. The above graph shows our pre and post assessment from the Jr. High advisory lessons. We have executive functioning growth across all areas.

To obtain a current and accurate data point on our school culture, we purchase a hallway survey machine. Every time students walked by they were encouraged to answer honestly. The daily question was "How are you doing today?" Over the course of the year we looked at how certain events, days, assemblies, free dress, testing, etc. and how the students were impacted. We made adjustments based on the student data. Here is a small snapshot of our year.

Positive Behavior Incentive System (PBIS)



Students receive points when they are showing the 4R's. They can use these points to buy items, parties, passes and so much more. Over 100,000 points were given this year!

TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL SUMMER

- **Getting involved with the community**
- **Become familiar with the social networks your child is using**
